

Key Messages — General

Early Childhood Week aims to give a voice to the 512,000 children aged five and under in Quebec and make early childhood development a true priority for our society.

Too many children are missing out on the opportunity to achieve their full potential. One in four — sometimes even one in three — exhibits vulnerability in at least one sphere of development by the time they start kindergarten.

By taking action as early as possible, beginning at pregnancy, we can give each baby an equal chance and put the conditions in place for every child to succeed.

Key Messages — General

Indigenous children need to be immersed in their culture and language and given the opportunity to flourish as individuals and members of their families, communities and Nations. Respect for the ties that connect Inuit, Métis and First Nations children to their political and cultural communities is vital, not only in helping them fulfill their potential but also in fostering their overall well-being.

Individual public policies on their own are not enough. It is the sum of multiple cohesive policies based on a current, integrated vision that takes the child development continuum into account that has the best chance of ensuring equal opportunities for all young children living in Quebec.

Key Messages — General

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The following top the list of priorities aimed at making sure efforts to improve children's well-being are invested wisely:

- Ensure an adequate standard of living: Provide access to affordable housing, healthy food in sufficient supply and a balance between family, work and studies, achieved through financial support proportionate to families' needs.
- Work together: Break down silos by building bridges between the various stakeholders and aligning our advocacy efforts with those of policy-makers.
- Take action as early as possible: Safeguard the health, well-being and development of all children, and ensure the best possible conditions and access to support are available to all parents, from pregnancy onward.
- Focus on services at the community level: Support locally delivered services and existing community networks so that they can work in an upstream capacity and serve as a catalyst for prevention.

Key Messages — Young Children's Rights

All children — regardless of their gender, parents, origin, culture, birthplace, living situation, language, religion, or mental or physical health — deserve to be treated fairly and equitably. It is our collective duty to ensure that the rights of all young children are upheld.

The events of the past few years have exacerbated numerous societal issues that have a direct impact on young children. These include inflation, environmental concerns, the dwindling availability of services and the lack of affordable housing. Now, more than ever, it is critical that we make early childhood development a true social priority. Our children deserve no less. Safeguarding their rights is a shared responsibility.

Key Messages — Young Children's Rights

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Babies, toddlers and preschoolers are entitled to:

- Receive a quality education
- Receive the best possible health care
- Be fed and clothed and have a safe place to live
- Be raised by adults who do what is best for them
- Have their rights protected by the government
- Play, rest and relax
- Use their own language, religion and culture with other members of their community.


